Spring Enrollment Update after 1st Week of Open Registration

Enrollments for Spring 2018 in the most recent report from the Institutional Research Office shows that Bakersfield College is at 71.8% of our Spring 2018 FTES target of 7,652.1.

Compared to this same time in the registration period last spring, Bakersfield College's headcount has increased by 5.5% and FTES increased by 5.4%.

Express Enrollment and Courses at Shafter Learning Center

Bakersfield College is bringing higher education to Shafter. The college course offerings at the Shafter Learning Center and Shafter High School will service a population of over 60,000 adults (18 and over) living within a twenty mile radius of both locations. The site will primarily support the communities of Wasco, Shafter, and McFarland and offer more than 15-20 courses each semester at the Shafter Learning Center and Shafter High School.

BC is focused on the strategic goal to bring higher education to the communities of Delano, Shafter, Wasco, McFarland, Lamont, and Arvin. Through outstanding community support, the passing of Measure J, and various industry partners, BC continues to develop plans and look ahead at the various ways the college can increase student support and course offerings. BC has been collaborating with the City of Shafter, Shafter High School, Grimmway Academy, and the Wonderful Company to develop greater access to higher education.

An Evening with Gerald Haslam

BC's faculty cohort for our National Endowment of the Humanities grant including Andrew Bond, Oliver Rosales and Josh Ottum hosted local author Gerald Haslam on campus for an evening presentation.

Haslam, who grew up in post-World War II Oildale, talked about his slow but steady evolution as a writer in the 50s and 60s. After attending Bakersfield College, Haslam worked as a military journalist and roughneck before teaching at Sonoma State University, where he was able to hone his craft, using the Central Valley as the thread that would weave the tapestry of his awardwinning novels, essays and biographies.

While many of his contemporaries saw Central California as boring and uncultured, Haslam recognized the potential of the Valley as a literary setting.
