#### Kern County Fairgrounds Opens Vaccination Site



Kern County Public Health is utilizing the Kern County Fairgrounds as a one-stop shop in the fight against COVID-19. In addition to being a large-scale testing and vaccine administration facility, the fairgrounds are the county's primary contact tracing site. More than 40 contact tracers have been employed by the county to reach out to individuals who may have been exposed to COVID-19.

Many of the contact tracers and medical staff on the frontlines of the county's response to the virus were trained right here at BC. Make sure all of your students and staff know that the Kern County Fairgrounds are open to support all of their testing, vaccination and contact tracing needs. <u>Visit the county vaccination map</u> to find more vaccination locations near you.

### **Delano Becomes First City in Kern County to Issue Fines for COVID-19 Violations**



<u>The Delano City Council has approved an ordinance</u> to issue fines for violations of the stayat-home order. The ordinance applies to gatherings of more than 10 people from different households in public spaces, as well as prohibited business activities like indoor dining and the operations of salons and barbershops. The ordinance is in place until February 16, and two code enforcement officers have been assigned to enforce it.

The COVID-19 task force and the leadership of Bakersfield College will continue to monitor and stay in compliance with all COVID-related community guidelines at all of our campuses, including Delano.

LA Times: Will California Vaccine Ramp-Up Squeeze Out Testing?



<u>Bernard Wolfson of California Healthline wrote in the LA Times</u> about the state's shift toward vaccination is exhausting our testing infrastructure, which could lead to longer waits for appointments at testing facilities and people potentially exposing others for a longer time before finding out that they've contracted the disease. However, the piece notes that many health officials support prioritizing vaccinations over testing as we enter a critical phase in broadening the vaccine rollout.

As vaccination guidelines expand to more of the population over the coming weeks, BC is committed to educating the community about the continued importance of testing and vaccination while building up the workforce to expand both.

#### **Germany Announces Medical-Grade Face Mask Requirements**



In Germany, the death rate for COVID-19 continues to rise even as the infection rate continues to slow down, <u>according to Medical</u> <u>Xpress</u>. Last week, <u>in addition to extending and</u> <u>tightening restrictions</u>, Chancellor Angela Merkel and the German government <u>mandated its citizens</u> to wear surgical masks or higher-specification <u>medical-grade masks such as N95 or PPT-2</u>. A cloth face covering does not meet the guidelines for

compliance under Germany's new law, but the government is providing financial aid for its citizens to procure the necessary PPE.

Health officials in Europe are arguing that due to the <u>high transmissibility and more deadly</u> <u>nature</u> of the B.1.1.7 variant, which has taken over the continent and <u>is estimated to</u> <u>become the dominant strain of the virus in the US by March</u>, more strict face covering is required. Here in the US, however, <u>the CDC continues to advise against citizens wearing</u> N95 respirators or surgical masks intended for health care workers.
