Kern County Meeting Yellow Tier Metrics in Two of Three Categories



 Less than 2.0 daily new cases (per 100k*)

 Less than 2.0% positive tests for entire county**

 Less than 2.2% positive tests for health equity quartile** In the latest information released by the California Department of Public Health, Kern County met two of the three metrics to reach the yellow or "minimal" tier of the state's <u>Blueprint for a Safer Economy</u>.

An article published April 27 <u>in the Bakersfield</u> <u>Californian</u> notes that the county must remain in the orange or "moderate" tier for two more weeks, as it still hadn't reached a case rate below 2 new cases per 100,000. <u>In a statement in the beginning of April</u>, Governor Newsom announced that the state will be removing the Blueprint for a Safer Economy restrictions on June 15 while continuing to mandate masking and encouraging Californians to get vaccinated.

CDC: Fully Vaccinated People Can Go Outdoors Unmasked



On April 29, <u>the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention updated its</u> <u>recommendations</u> for fully-vaccinated people, noting that fully-vaccinated people no longer need to wear a mask outdoors, except in certain crowded settings and venues. The update also notes that fully-vaccinated workers no longer need to be restricted from work following an exposure as long as they are asymptomatic, and that they also may be exempted from routine screening testing. The CDC guidelines emphasize that immunocompromised people should consult their healthcare provider regarding these recommendations, even if they are vaccinated.

Data Corner

Vaccine Tracker

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has <u>a vaccination dashboard</u> that tracks the number of COVID-19 vaccines administered and delivered across the United States. The California Department of Public Health has <u>a dashboard tracking vaccinations in the</u> <u>state</u> overall and by county. However, neither the CDC or CDPH dashboards provide information about the number of vaccine doses delivered by county.
