COVID Dashboards

Effective Friday, May 8, California began moving into Stage two of its reopening. Some counties have submitted local variance attestations to move more quickly through the stages by proving they have met the criteria for accelerated reopening Governor Newsom has established in his <u>Resilience Roadmap</u>:

- No more than 1 case per 10,000 people in the last 14 days
- No COVID-19 deaths in the past 14 days
- Minimum daily testing of 1.5 tests per 1,000 residents
- At least 15 contact tracers per 100,000 residents
- County or regional hospital capacity to accommodate a minimum surge of 35%



Kern has not met two of the key criteria. Here is how Kern stacks up:

Criteria	Kern
No more than 1 case per 10,000 people in the last 14 days	5.27 cases per 10,000
No COVID-19 deaths in the past 14 days	17 deaths in the past 14 days

In addition, Kern has seen a 34.5% increase in hospitalizations related to COVID-19 in the past 14 days. The CDC recommends a 14 day decrease in hospitalizations before reopening.

In his daily briefing earlier this week, Newsom specifically mentioned unique circumstances in Kern, including the high rate of infections and deaths due to an outbreak in a single, state-run nursing home. Though he has committed to work with Kern to discuss an accelerated movement through stage 2, we have not yet heard the details of the agreement and Kern remains subject to the terms of the Stay-at-Home order.

As of today May 16, 2020 at 10:00 a.m., the <u>Johns Hopkins University Dashboard</u> shows over 4.5 million confirmed COVID-19 cases worldwide. Here is the table that captures the difference in the numbers from my last Renegade Roundup.

The <u>IHME Dashboard</u> updated its projections again on May 12, showing a projection of 147,040 total COVID-19 deaths in the United States (5,832 of them in California) by August 4, 2020 - a large jump from the about 72,000 it projected in late April.
