Of course, I want to recognize Tom Gelder, who had been working with the Mettlers for a while on this gift. I also want to thank the team that prepared such a solid proposal for the family: Heather Baltis, agriculture department chair; Kylie Campbell, program director of Early College; Jessica Wojtysiak, dean of instruction; and Susan Hubbell, Foundation financial information manager. They put this proposal together in just seven days. That is what BC does, and it's what the Foundation does.

We received a beautiful letter from the family spokesperson, expressing the family's appreciation for the gratitude we had shown them. They felt the proposal was exactly what their aunt and uncle, Patricia and Clifford Mettler, would have wanted.

#### **Enrollment Update**

Due to COVID the enrollment patterns have changed. For summer it started slow. Students were not sure what to do and then a few weeks prior to the start of summer school, enrollments surged and BC ended with a significant growth of 8% this summer over last summer. We are expecting this pattern to continue into the fall. The August 12th enrollment report from KCCD IR shows this trend in comparison to last week's update. A few weeks ago we were 30% down in FTES this fall compared to last; that number is now only 5.8%

### Statements on Integrity from the Bakersfield College President's Cabinet

In my last Roundup, I included statements from the President's Cabinet on our core value of integrity. Here are some more statements:

Integrity is the single most essential component of team work. It will be necessary at all levels of our organization to drive the work of the college. Integrity is required of us, as leaders and as team members. The integrity of our leader sustains us as we move forward during troubled times and work to support her vision. It empowers us to listen with respect and intent, to speak with authenticity, and to use the resources available to us to guide our work. As leaders, integrity means role modeling the behaviors that we expect from our employees. It means taking responsibility and being accountable when our own behavior falls short. Integrity is being able to reflect, implement corrective measures, and move forward. Integrity is taking constructive criticism and offering honest feedback to others. It means extending grace, care, and support for ourselves and for our teammates. Ultimately, integrity is about trust. We trust that our coworkers have the integrity to lead with positive intent and to work toward a common vision. -Carla Gard, Associate Dean of Nursing

Integrity is about being genuine and honest, not just with others, but with oneself. It is about being transparent and not being afraid to admit when you cannot give or do not have all the answers. Integrity is ensuring the narrative we build is solid, unified and an honest depiction of the values we uphold as an institution and on a personal level. It means challenging and questioning as well as being open to being challenged and questioned. It requires us to do what is right, whether it is in front of a large audience or when alone. It means stepping forward, speaking up, and being okay with being uncomfortable if it is for the right intent. --Norma Rojas-Mora, Director, Communication and Community Relations

Perhaps the most interesting concept is building a student's integrity. The integrity of an individual is an attribute that the individual needs to personally develop. As student affairs practitioners, we are helping to develop our student's thinking, to be loyal to their morals and ethical principles. The students are charged with an obligation. It is the responsibility of the student to maintain the standards that they have set for themselves. When in leadership positions, students are responsible not only for maintaining their personal integrity, but also expand responsibility to their organization. Personal growth will occur when our students maintain their integrity consistently. I believe a student's word should be accepted until significant evidence exists to prove otherwise. There may be occasions when students are questioned as to their behavior, performance, conduct, accuracy, or the completeness of the final product. Generally, as student affairs practitioners, we are to challenge our student's ideas, to help them to think in different ways, but doubting a student's integrity, is unprofessional and should be avoided. On the other hand, trust is linked to an individual's integrity and that trust can only be earned. Only through continuous interactions can ar individual earn the trust of another. Trust comes from a commitment to truthfulness: being completely honest and outspoken in all instances. As student affairs practitioners, we should be good role models for our students, as our integrity is also noted by our students."\*The statement holds true to me even when the word "student" is changed with "colleague" or "community." - Nicky Damania, Director of Student Life (excerpt from his Philosophy of Student Affairs, 2015)

#### **COVID-19 Updates**

Last Monday, <u>Governor Newsom announced that his administration had corrected inaccuracies in the state's CalREDIE coronavirus reporting platform.</u> The resulting backlog that this technical error has caused will result in an undercount of cases in the data used for all of the dashboards below.

#### Positivity Rates from Covid19.CA.gov:

The State of California's COVID-19 county reporting dashboard lists reporting statistics over a 14-day period. A table with the test positivity rates over the last 14 days from several counties on the monitoring list is below. As you can see, the Central Valley has been hit particularly hard with Kern's rates among the highest in the past 14 days. Added this new dashboard because it includes the Test Positivity Rate.
