#### **Opening Week Highlights**

This year's Opening Week festivities stretched into the first week of classes as the Renegade family gathered for the last two hours of livestream video programming, which included a poignant collection of remarks from our faculty and staff leadership, updates on our major ongoing initiatives for the year, and inspirational music by our talented performing arts students.

#### **COVID-19 Updates**

On Friday, <u>Governor Newsom announced modified reopening guidelines for counties</u>, unveiling a new reopening system based on four color-coded levels of risk.

Kern County and a majority of the state are in the purple or "widespread" tier, meaning that many non-essential business operations are closed; however, guidelines have been altered to open hair salons and barbershops for indoor operations at 25 percent capacity. If Kern County reaches less than 7 daily new cases per 100,000 over a 7-day period and a less than 8 percent test positivity rate, it would be eligible to move to a lower risk level, which would allow for indoor operations of gyms, house of worship, museums, movie theaters and more with modifications and reduced capacity.

The governor's office also announced a new contract with a diagnostics company that will allow California to increase its\_testing capacity in preparation for the flu season, adding up to 150,000 diagnostic tests per day with a 24-48 hour guaranteed turnaround time.

Earlier this week, an article in the New York Times reported on the first documented retransmission of coronavirus in Hong Kong. A 33-year-old man contracted COVID-19 four months after recovering from his first infection, although he had no symptoms the second time and his body had developed an immune response to the disease. Doctors in the United States had reported presumed reinfections before, but this was the first case that was confirmed with rigorous testing and genome sequencing.

### Positivity Rates from Covid19.CA.gov:

The State of California's COVID-19 county reporting dashboard has been modified to fit the new guidelines that were announced Friday. The new dashboard examines metrics over a 7-day period, whereas the previous dashboard looked at statistics recorded over a 14-day period.

A table with the comparison of test positivity rates from several counties on the monitoring list is below. Please note the difference in accounting metrics.

#### Johns Hopkins Dashboard:

As of 4:30 p.m. on August 31, the <u>Johns Hopkins University Dashboard</u> shows the U.S. has surpassed 6 million total confirmed cases of COVID-19. Here is the table that captures the difference in the numbers from August 24 - 7 days ago.
