KCCD Announcement About Spring 2021

In an email on Wednesday, September 30, Chancellor **Tom Burke** announced that for Spring 2021 "the majority of instruction and support operations will continue in the current online and remote environments " for the Kern Community College District.

An excerpt from his message below:

The majority of instruction and support operations will continue in the current online and remote environment. A limited number

of instructional courses and support functions will be provided in-person for students to continue their progress to degree. Understanding this decision is disappointing to some, it was made in the interests of maintaining the health and safety of our students and employees.

The College Presidents will continue to communicate their specific operational plans to their campus community. We are optimistic that with the progress of potential vaccines and treatments KCCD can return to campus operations in fall 2021. We will continue to share information and planning details as soon as they become available.

COVID-19 Update

COVID-19 Testing on Panorama Campus

On Thursday, COVID-19 testing on the Panorama Campus continued for a second week with a free mobile testing site on the corner of Haley and University. This program is a partnership with the Kern County Hispanic Chamber of Commerce and Kern County Public Health, and the clinic uses the less invasive "self-swab" test.

If you think you should get tested for COVID-19, <u>visit the registration link</u> and bring the appointment voucher with your reference number to the clinic. The Mobile Testing unit also accepts a limited amount of walk-up participants.

Blueprint For a Safer Economy Dashboard

<u>The State of California's Blueprint For a Safer Economy dashboard</u> has been modified to fit the new guidelines announced in August. The new dashboard examines metrics over a 7-day period, whereas the previous dashboard looked at statistics recorded over a 14-day period. A table with the comparison of test positivity rates from several counties on the monitoring list is below.
