CCLC Presentations

Community College League of California held their annual conference in Palm Springs this month. I had the opportunity to present in two different sessions representing Kern CCD. The first session was titled, "Central Valley Transfer Project Going Statewide" The sessions description said, "This project



bean with the goal of increasing Central Valley CC transfer to UC Merced. Today the project also includes partnerships with CSU Bakersfield, CSU Stanislaus and 12 Central Valley CC's. This enlightening event featured a panel of successful entrepreneurs who have transcended the barriers of incarceration to establish thriving businesses and redefine their life narratives. The event was hosted by Bakersfield College Acting President, Steven Watkin and took place November 8th.

Panelists shared their remarkable journeys, shedding light on the pivotal role education played in their rehabilitation and subsequent success. Our facilitator for the event was Keith Wolaridge, author, a trustee for the Panama-Buena Vista Union School District, and a full-time Business professor at Bakersfield College.

BC Agriculture Science Ground Breaking

Bakersfield College celebrated a significant milestone with the groundbreaking ceremony for its new Agriculture Sciences building. The event marked the commencement of construction on a cutting edge, 3-story facility that will revolutionize the learning experience for students within the College's top-ranked agriculture program.



Funded by Measure J, a \$502 million bond passed in November 2016, the new Agriculture Sciences building is planned to include an impressive 49,546 square feet of total building area, which includes exterior covered areas. This state-of-the-art learning space will be a hub of innovation, providing students and faculty with cutting-edge resources to advance research and education in agriculture. The building will house food production and sciences facilities, a mechanized agricultural workshop, and a range of agricultural sciences labs, including those for tissue/growth, animal studies, vet tech, horticulture, soils, plant science, and forestry.

Delano Regenerative Farm CREL Demonstration Project

Earlier this month, the BC Agriculture
Department and the California Renewable
Energy Laboratory unveiled their new
Regenerative Agriculture Education Center
at the BC Delano Campus. This facility,
which was made possible by a generous
donation by the Ravi and Naina Patel
Foundation, will lead the way in
development of sustainable agricultural
practices at the community college level
statewide. As the Regenerative Agriculture
Education Center develops, the farm will
include a solar greenhouse, composting



and smart irrigation systems, and a demonstration project testing agrivoltaics, which involves growing crops alongside solar panels. As the state chancellor's office urges campuses to adopt sustainability measures as part of Project 2030, BC's Regenerative Agriculture Education Center will help our district stay on the cutting edge of mitigating the effects of climate change.

Update on Chancellor Search

Just a quick update on the chancellor search. The consultants and screening committee have been very busy reviewing candidates and narrowing down the pool for the board to review. The process is still on schedule. The Board of Trustees will review finalists on December 4th. I appreciate the rigor of the process and the dedication of those serving on the committee.
